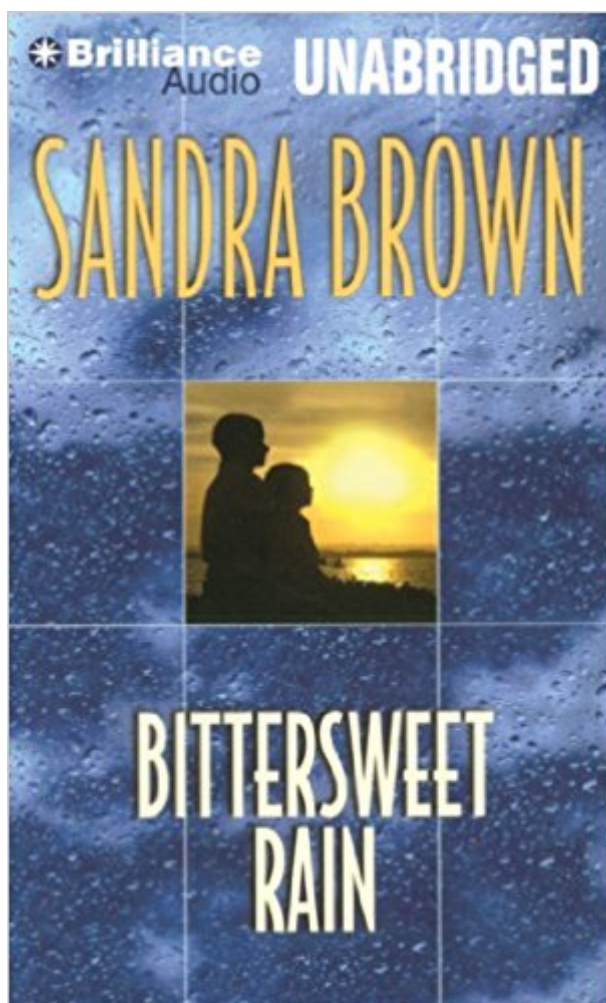


The book was found

I've read more recent books by Sandra Brown and really liked them, so I thought I'd give this one a shot. Should have known better. First off, reading the scenes where the heroine, Caroline, is 15, made me feel like a pedophile. And we're supposed to think that some 22-year old guy who takes advantage of an obviously naive 15-year old is a good guy? Just because he oh-so-nobly decides to wait to have sex with her until he tells his dad about her, that makes it OK? Next, how can you have any sympathy or respect for a romantic heroine who flat out admits that she married a nasty, horrible man for wealth and status? She had a job, she was supporting herself fine. It's not like she was living on the streets and that was her only way out. Chalk up two in the ick factor. Finally, while it was much better handled than the rest of the story, the subplot involving a developmentally disabled girl and a much older Vietnam vet bothered me, probably because Brown was never consistent or detailed in explaining what the developmental disability was. And the descriptions of her actions were inconsistent as to her capabilities. The net result is, it feels a little creepy. And even though she does try to make it sweet, the first time the vet kisses her, he's feeling her up. Which again, makes it feel like she's taken advantage of. All in all, while I still really like Sandra Brown, I'm sticking to her books that were written in the last decade. I would also caution anyone against buying this on a Kindle, as the spelling and punctuation is awful, so that you have to go back and reread whole paragraphs just to figure out what it's supposed to say.

There is something about this book that makes me feel vaguely dirty every time I pick it up. The heroine is unlikable, weak, and a sort of disgusting gold-digger. The hero started his seduction of her when she was 15 and he was graduating college, ran off with another woman, and then returns full of vengeful anger at HER for marrying his father for the guy's money and his big house. Ew all around. He returns when his father is on his death bed, only to begin verbally abusing the heroine, practically molesting her before her husband (HIS FATHER) is actually dead, stomping all over her consent in just about every way in some sort of macho intimidation tactic (pushing his way into her room at night to "talk" to her, dictating where she goes, cornering her, grabbing her, etc.) Mix in some seriously shaky ground with the side-plot romance (between a Vietnam war vet and a mentally disabled 22 year old girl who's described as having the mind of a young child), and the whole book just makes me want to boil my Kindle to get the ick out.

For word was sent to him that his father had become ill and he replied that he was coming home. Breaking her heart years earlier when Caroline was just a teenager, she kept thinking back to that time when they both fell in love in that "bittersweet rain". Now, she can only surmise that the gorgeous Rink Lancaster that she once knew and loved probably despised her for marrying the richest man in the county, his father. On his arrival, Rink and Caroline's first encounter is not a good one to say the least. He is embittered, crude, obnoxious and time and time again, flirtatious. The truth was Rink was torn up inside because not for one moment did he ever stop loving Caroline. So why in God's name, did she marry not only the richest man but the meanest one as well? With the Lancaster cotton gins breaking down, Rink and Caroline must take charge while Roscoe is in the hospital and this infuriated the old man. Ignoring his orders by having more concern for the workers, Rink and Caroline find themselves once again falling in those uncharted waters of their love. The truth is, Caroline had no idea what really forced Rink to leave all those years before and Rink was totally in the dark of why Caroline married his father to begin with and his opinions couldn't be further from the truth. Will Rink ever learn the truth? What about Caroline? Will she? Or is their chances doomed from the beginning? As time goes on between all the hatred, lies and deceit not to mention best kept secrets, it will be a dark and rocky road before they will ever find what they are looking for especially of what they once shared so long ago.....thank you
